




LAW ENFORCEMENT PROCESS

The Division of Professional Regulation (DPR) is legislatively mandated to administer and enforce 59 separate legislative acts that regulate the conduct of many professions in Illinois.

Responsibility for the enforcement of these acts rests with the Statewide Enforcement Section. The Division of Statewide Enforcement is responsible for the investigation of alleged violations of any regulatory statutes under the Division's jurisdiction and subsequent prosecution of these Acts.

Functionally, the Investigations Unit compiles facts of the allegation and the Prosecutions Unit seeks to prove the validity of the complaint. Substantiated allegations are presented to the Director for appropriate discipline.

Professional complaints against any individual or business regulated by the DPR may be filed with the Department by contacting the Complaint Intake Unit. Sources of complaints include members of the public (can be made anonymously), other licensees, law enforcement agencies, and other governmental agencies. Irregularities also are discovered by the agency during the course of enforcement activities, special enforcement programs, and other routine inspections.

The disciplinary process begins when DPR becomes aware of a complaint against a licensee or individual/business offering professional services in Illinois without a license.

After initial review, complaints are assigned to a lead investigator. The investigator is responsible for determining if DPR has (1) legal jurisdiction and/or (2) adequate evidence to proceed with any potential violation of a licensing law. After developing facts in cases where there appears to be a proper legal jurisdiction and adequate evidence, the investigator presents the case to the Design Complaint Review subcommittee for the respective professional board for its consideration.

The board recommendation, after thorough review, is then given to the Investigator. If there is insufficient evidence to indicate a violation of the particular licensing statute; the investigative file is closed, however, the investigator also may discover facts that indicate criminal activity which can lead to referral to a county State's Attorney or the Illinois Attorney General.

If the subcommittee for the respective professional board determines that there is sufficient evidence of a violation, the findings are forwarded to DPR's prosecuting attorneys staff for review. After review by a prosecuting attorney, it may be determined that further investigative evidence is needed. If the staff attorney concludes that the matter has been sufficiently investigated and there is evidence supporting the complaint, formal charges are filed. Depending upon the contextual circumstances of the case, DPR and the licensee may enter into a negotiated agreement regarding the level of discipline to be imposed and presented to the Director of Professional Regulation for consideration and approval.

In instances where a formal disciplinary hearing is necessary, a formal complaint is drafted and filed. The hearing is held before the Department's Administrative Law Judge. The hearing is an administrative law proceeding conducted pursuant to the Illinois Civil Administrative Code and other relevant statutes and rules. After the hearing, the prosecuting attorney delivers the findings, conclusions, and recommendations to the Director of Professional Regulation.

Disciplinary action resulting from any enforcement action varies by violation and severity and can include: **termination of license**, **revocation**, **suspension**, **probation**, **reprimand**, **and censure**. The license may also be ordered to remain in good standing. In addition, Illinois law allows for the imposition of fines up to \$10,000 per offense for any of the professions regulated by the Division.

Following a final decision by the Director, the licensee has 35 days to make an appeal in circuit court under the Illinois Administrative Review Act. Investigations referred for criminal prosecution have resulted in numerous criminal convictions. Criminal violations include unlicensed practice of various professions, theft, forgery, unlawful use of weapons, diversions of controlled substances to illegal use and other related offenses.

HOW TO FILE A COMPLAINT

Complaints against any individual or entity regulated by the Division of Professional Regulation may be filed by contacting the Complaint Intake Unit.

Did someone say Renewal time?

The Professional Engineer license will be in renewal this Fall. Renewal is required for all licensees, regardless of when the license is issued. On or near September 1st, all active professional engineer licensees should receive an email with instructions on how to renew the license through the online portal.

Unless renewed, the license will expire on 11/30/2023.

You may review the renewal requirements at the below sections of the rules for the administration of the Professional Engineering Practicing Act.

Note, if you renew your license online during the pre-renewal period, you are NOT required to submit proof of your PDH's to the Department. You are only required to submit proof of completion of your PDH's if you submit a paper renewal/reinstatement after the expiration date or you are required to do so by the Enforcement Unit as part of a random audit.

A reminder, the Rules were recently updated to allow for carryover of acceptable excess PDHs. A maximum of 15 hours gained between June 1st and November 30th that will not be used for the 2023 renewal may be carried over toward the 2025 renewal. Hours must be documented and maintained on the carryover form.

NEWLY LICENSED?

We recommend that you review the code enforcement manual to ensure that you and your Professional Design Firm are in compliance with all applicable requirements as well as find an example to use when you purchase your Illinois seal. Illinois does not supply a seal or approve any vendors. You may purchase your seal at a vendor of your choice.

As long as it is a reproducible seal (non-embossed) it will be accepted.

PE MINING/MINERAL PROCESSING PAKS SURVEY

NCEES is currently seeking mining and/or mineral processing engineers to participate in a professional activities and knowledge study, or PAKS, for the PE Mining and Mineral Processing exam. The results of this online survey will be used to update the specifications for the exam, which is a process that occurs every six to eight years.
